### REMEMBERING OUR LOVED ONES - A PLACE OF MEMORIAL

As Covid continues so many more of us have been unable to attend a funeral of a loved one or a friend. Others will have been unable to grieve in a variety of ways because of the guidelines enforced at the moment. Many can't visit the graves of loved ones because of travel restrictions.

Many have come from within and outside our Benefice to St Wystan's in Repton to light a candle and say a prayer, but we felt that for others, perhaps you, a family member or a friend, that might not be enough or that going into church might feel awkward.

**Until mid-April** we have set aside an area near the Lychgate in St Wystan's Churchyard in Repton as a Place of Memorial. A low fence encloses an area of grass and the first yew tree. On one side there is a Cross made out of the Christmas Trees used in Church this last December.

**Anyone is most welcome** to come and place flowers, photos, momentos, or any item with special significance on the ground either under the tree or around the Cross. If you wish to hang a prayer, photo, ribbon or lightweight momento from the tree you are most welcome to do so. [We know that Churchyard regulations don't allow such things but this is a special one off event in a defined area so we are turning a blind eye for 7 weeks].

All we ask is that you don't leave anything made from glass, or which is dangerous or easily breakable, and please, do not hang things from the tree over the path. We reserve the right to remove items that are not 'safe'.

The Place of Memorial will continue through Easter [our Christian Festival marking the death of Jesus and Celebrating His Resurrection] another time when many people also remember loved ones by visiting graves and so on. At our services on Mothering Sunday and Easter a special prayer will be said for all our loved ones.

We plan to clear the area later in April so would ask if you wish to retrieve a momento you do so before

**Monday April 19**<sup>th</sup>. We do pray continually for all those who die and for those who mourn the loss of loved ones – may you know God's peace if you are mourning at this time. Martin the Vicar

### **DIOCESAN VISION**

Last Tuesday evening members of our three PCC's met to consider the new Diocesan Vision. What follows was prepared by Ruth Attwood from Diocesan sources to help PCC members prepare for the meeting

Bishop Libby expresses the vision in these terms –

"We are called to proclaim afresh, in this generation, the good news of the Kingdom of God.

That call means being open to renewal, which renewal will lead to reformation – it always does – and, so renewed and reformed, we pray for revival. We honour the saving work of God that we inherit, and which has been at work in us but, learning from and building on the faithful, fruitful mission and ministry already in place, we are called to proclaim afresh – in this generation.

Our Vocation is to the Kingdom of God which is Good News for all.

And our Vision aims to see that Kingdom translated into **Transformed lives: seen in growing Church and building community.** 

These aims are driven by our values of generous faith, courageous hope and live-giving love."

How do we intend to change our approach to achieve these Aims? (discussed at December 2020 Diocesan Synod)

These are the intentional changes we wish to take, and are already experiencing, that underpin our approach to meet the three aims –

### Transformed Lives -

- ☐ By interweaving our lives with those of others in our homes, workplaces, schools and communities, extending the vision of transformed lives to those not yet aware of the life God has for them.

# Grow Church — By reaching more of those currently not in our churches, growing younger, more diverse, and into the most socially deprived communities By seeking growth in number through — Offering relevant, faithful and creative worship Being committed to community engagement Utilising sensitive and appropriate evangelism that reaches all ages in all contexts Ensuring engaging and accessible teaching and formation in faith By growing in ecumenical relationships, collaboration and shared working By recognising that time-honoured church is likely to look and feel very different, and by instituting planning and pioneering initiatives By recognising that growth means change, and may mean endings Build Community — By renewing our commitment to one another and the places and spaces we call home

The first steps in order to realise this vision calls us to *equip people* for the task of mission; *adapt structures* that can hold and enable the growth and missional change we seek; and so to organise and *sustain our resources* in such a way as to continue our common mission.

By joining with the work of the Spirit beyond our buildings and congregations, realising that we do

By embracing and including those people and places that are unfamiliar and challenging

Two of the key outcomes which are being developed are –

not hold the monopoly on God's Kingdom

- Archdeaconry re-organisation, and
- Deployment, including that of clergy

Conversation about these outcomes is continuing. Some Deanery events have been held and more will take place and time and space to develop plans will be allowed. More material will be produced shortly to help churches to engage with the vision. Discussion and feedback is invited at all levels.

There are clearly budgetary implications, and recognition that Diocesan finances are not going to be as healthy as they were pre-Covid, but the desire is that the Vision is not to be driven by the budget but the budget is to serve the vision. Paid (stipendiary) Clergy will be working alongside self-supporting ministers (SSMs) and lay people to achieve the vision. Clergy roles will include equipping and enabling those in their parishes to share in mission. Incumbents will be deployed to 'primary contexts' which will have a number of other worshipping communities related to them, such as:

- Cultural and heritage centres e.g. places of social, cultural or visitor interest
- Geographical hub churches with a strong core (financial, numerical, vocational, spiritual)
- Centres of opportunity and growth e.g. new communities with unreached people groups
- Churches of greater growth potential larger strong churches which have a wider impact
- Population targeted churches i.e. where there is greater population density, maybe church schools.
- Estate churches on significant estates where the church is currently absent
- Areas of significant deprivation to 'proclaim good news to the poor'

The diocese is starting to develop key posts, such as Ordained and Lay Ministry Development Officers to give support to clergy and laity to work out the implications of their locally appropriate mission.

Re-organisation of the archdeaconries involves adding a third archdeacon in the Diocese. The aim is to provide for better local support with archdeacons having a smaller geographical focus and jurisdiction over fewer deaneries, so able to spend more time in parishes to help develop and deliver their mission locally. The three archdeaconries will reflect the three major social and economic settings in the diocese –

- Rural and Market Town Peak, Carsington, Dove and Derwent deaneries
- Developing Industrial N.E. Derbyshire, Hardwick and S.E. Derbyshire deaneries
- City and Urban Derby City and Mercia deaneries
