Here is a recent release from the Diocese on keeping churches open
National restrictions in England from 5 January 2021 Following Monday's statement by
the Prime Minister, national restrictions are now in place across England.
The current advice allows that churches may remain open for communal worship and that
Holy Communion may still be administered as long as strict adherence to the Latest
guidance is followed.

However, there is no compulsion to open church buildings. Should you decide that it is better, for pastoral care and mission, to close then this decision will be supported. (As churches are not legally required to close, churches that wish to close during this lockdown period, or that are not offering Holy Communion, need to notify the Bishop of the PCC's resolution to that effect, and request permission to be exempt from that canonical requirement.)

We suggest that clergy and PCCs do reconsider their plans in light of recent developments. Any subsequent changes to continuing practice or provision in the church building that require updates to their risk-assessments, should be signed off by the respective archdeacon.

The new national restrictions are clear that there must be no mingling with anyone outside of a household or support bubble when attending a place of worship and that strict social distancing must be maintained at all times. Therefore, no social mingling before, during or after a service is permissible. Given the increased infectivity of the new variant of the Covid-19 virus, incumbents, PCCs and churchwardens should consider what they need to do to encourage the continued wearing of masks as people leave the building and for everyone to disperse immediately outside.

Funerals may still take place with a maximum of 30 people in attendance (this figure does not include those working). Weddings may only take place in exceptional circumstances and with a maximum of 6 people (not including workers).

We remain grateful for the safe practices being followed. Please continue to uphold the exemplary behaviours that we are all working to apply coherently.

ROOF REPAIRS AND PORCH ROOF RENEWAL - ST WYSTAN'S.

In late October we were delighted to receive a grant offer of over £19,000 from the Government's Heritage Stimulus Fund administered by Historic England and the Church of England as part of the Culture Recovery Fund for Capital projects. This will provide 80% of the cost (excluding VAT) of the necessary work to repair the lead roofs and gutters and renew the porch roof. We hope to receive further grants to help meet the balance. The work is due to start on 18th January and will take about 6 weeks. The church will remain open as normal during this time.

DAILYHOPE PHONE LINE

DailyHope, a free national telephone line, offers music, prayers and reflections as well as full worship services from the Church of England at the end of the phone.

A Church of England initiative in partnership with CONNECTIONS at Holy Trinity Claygate, and Faith in Later Life.

The line – which is available 24 hours a day on **0800 804 8044** – has been set up particularly with those unable to join online church services during the period of restrictions in mind; to provide comfort and spiritual nourishment to the most isolated in our society.
