From a local Christian to a Friend [published with permission]

Dear	,

I am sad to hear you have been diagnosed with idiopathic intracranial hypertension. It sounds as if you have been going through a horrible time and that's rotten but I have been very struck by your positivity.

As to how I have coped having a long term illness and being a Christian, I think the first thought that comes to mind is that I don't know how I would have coped if I hadn't had a faith! That said, there will be difficult times.

The big questions are why me and why doesn't God heal me. Christians have wrestled with these ideas for years.

I think we have to be clear that being a Christian doesn't exempt us from the realities of living in a broken world. Paul had his thorn in the flesh. Jesus knew that his dear friends would be tortured to death. Being a Christian doesn't give us a Get out of Jail free card! So I don't ask why me - I could answer that myself - why not me!

I find the harder question is why doesn't God heal me when the Bible tells us that healing is an integral part of Christian ministry. It is a mystery why some are healed but not all. I think sometimes God can use us despite our illnesses or disabilities and that sometimes he is able to use us more fully because of them. You may experience disappointment and frustration if church members pray for you, anoint you with oil even, but your physical problems remain. I would say two things - one, that healing comes in many forms. The strength to endure, the peace to stop raging against the feeling of helplessness, a good night's sleep, a decision on benefits that help stave off financial worries - or the appearance of someone in your life at the right time... words of kindness, a helping hand. So many ways God can answer prayer. The second point is timing. I am so much better than I was when I was in --------------. At my worst, I had a wheelchair that laid flat like a stretcher because there would be times when I didn't have the strength to sit up or to hold the weight of my head. I remember feeling so unwell and now I am enormously better than that. I don't use any walking aids at all which would have felt impossible 20 years ago. Healing can come when you least expect it.

Having said all of that, we are only human. When you are ill, or when I am ill anyway, the energy to keep faith burning brightly can be elusive. I used to think of my faith as being like a pilot light. Sometimes my faith would burn brightly but sometimes it only felt like the dullest glow. But the thing about a pilot light is that that tiny light can burst into a strong flame when it's really needed and that was my reassurance.

Sometimes, at my worst, I would feel full of resentment that other people didn't seem to be suffering like this, that I didn't deserve this that my family didn't deserve to go through this with me. It helped to know that God is big enough to take on all my emotions - anger, sorrow, disappointment, resentment - the lot! The Psalms are full of these emotions and God wants us to know that's ok. That is our human nature - and He still loves us. I believe the Psalms are in the Bible so that we can see how someone like David can rail against God when times are hard and yet still be full of love and praise for God the creator. The Psalm show us how God lavished love on David despite the frankness of David's anger, disappointments and frustrations. I think God weeps when we weep and feels love and compassion for us when we suffer.

------, you will find your own path through this. You have already shown extraordinary courage and fortitude. I do pray that you will be healed - because healing does happen - but I also pray you will know - and experience fully - God's love, his compassion and his sustaining presence as you find a way through this difficult time.
